Moreover, adventure tourism has emerged as a global phenomenon, with significant economic, social and environmental implications (Newsome and Moore, 2012). - Common associations: vast deserts, historical sites, cultural richness rated as moderate 78%: The association of Saudi Arabia with vast deserts, historical sites and cultural richness aligns with the country's unique geographical and cultural assets. Leveraging these associations through strategic branding and storytelling can strengthen Saudi Arabia's positioning as an adventure tourism destination. Highlighting the diversity of adventure activities available within these landscapes and the rich cultural experiences awaiting visitors may further enhance the destination's appeal.

6.2. Factors Influencing Destination Choice:

Additionally, promoting Saudi Arabia's safety record and measures taken to ensure visitor security can help alleviate concerns and build trust among potential tourists.

6.3. Interest in Specific Adventure Activities:

Improved safety measures, sustainable tourism practices, authentic cultural experiences: These factors significantly influence respondents' likelihood to choose Saudi Arabia as an adventure tourism destination. Emphasising the implementation of rigorous safety protocols, adopting sustainable tourism practices and facilitating authentic cultural interactions are key strategies for enhancing the destination's attractiveness. Engaging with local communities, promoting responsible tourism initiatives and incorporating cultural authenticity into visitor experiences can address these concerns effectively.

6.5. Sustainable Tourism Practices:

- Preferences for destinations prioritising sustainability and conservation efforts (70%): The strong preference for destinations prioritising sustainability underscores the importance of environmental stewardship in adventure tourism. Integrating sustainability principles into destination planning, resource management and visitor experiences can align with tourists' values and preferences. Certification programs, eco-friendly accommodation options and community-based tourism initiatives can further enhance the destination's sustainability credentials and appeal to environmentally conscious travellers.
- Willingness to pay premium for environmentally conscious experiences: The willingness to pay a premium indicates a market demand for sustainable tourism products and experiences. Developing premium eco-tourism offerings, such as low-impact adventure tours, wildlife conservation expeditions and sustainable accommodation options, can cater to this segment of travellers. Highlighting the social and environmental benefits of such experiences can justify premium pricing and attract discerning travellers seeking meaningful and responsible travel experiences.

7. Hypothetical Results and Analysis

7.1. Hypothesis 1 'Economic Benefits of Adventure Tourism':

The advancement of adventure tourism in Saudi Arabia is hypothesised to result in significant economic benefits, including increased revenue from tourism-related ventures, the creation of employment opportunities across sectors like hospitality and outdoor recreation and the stimulation of local economies in rural and remote

regions.

Result: The findings indicate a potential for substantial economic gains through adventure tourism. Survey data revealed a strong interest in adventure activities, with 83% of respondents expressing enthusiasm for desert safaris and 85% for mountain climbing. These activities, when strategically promoted and developed, can generate revenue streams from tourism-related ventures such as guided tours, accommodations, and adventure equipment rentals. Furthermore, the development of adventure tourism infrastructure and services can create job opportunities across sectors, contributing to economic diversification and growth.

7.2. Hypothesis 2 'Sustainable Management Strategies':

The implementation of sustainable management strategies, such as setting carrying capacity limits, enacting zoning regulations and initiating community engagement endeavours, is hypothesised to mitigate adverse environmental and social repercussions associated with adventure tourism. These efforts are expected to safeguard Saudi Arabia's natural heritage and preserve its cultural authenticity over the long term.

Result: Respondents expressed a strong preference (70%) for destinations prioritising sustainability and conservation efforts. This finding underscores the importance of integrating sustainable management strategies into adventure tourism development. By establishing carrying capacity limits, enacting zoning regulations, and engaging local communities in decision-making processes, adverse environmental and social impacts can be mitigated. These efforts contribute to the preservation of Saudi Arabia's natural and cultural heritage, ensuring its long-term sustainability as an adventure tourism destination.

7.3. Hypothesis 3 'Public-Private Collaborative Ventures':

Collaborative ventures between the public and private sectors are hypothesised to be pivotal in propelling investments and fostering innovation in adventure tourism infrastructure and services. By harnessing the expertise and resources of both governmental and private stakeholders, these partnerships aim to enrich visitor experiences, bolster destination competitiveness and drive industry growth.

Result: The study findings support the hypothesis that public-private partnerships play a crucial role in advancing adventure tourism. Stakeholder consultations revealed a consensus on the importance of collaboration in infrastructure development, marketing initiatives and capacity building. By leveraging the strengths of both sectors, innovative solutions can be implemented to enhance visitor experiences and destination competitiveness. Furthermore, these partnerships stimulate investment and drive industry growth, positioning Saudi Arabia as a leading adventure tourism destination.

7.4. Hypothesis 4 'Cultural Exchange and Intercultural Comprehension':

Through the promotion of cultural exchange and intercultural comprehension, adventure tourism in Saudi Arabia is hypothesised to cultivate broader global awareness and appreciation of the Kingdom's rich historical legacy, traditions and cultural diversity. This is expected to forge positive relationships with international visitors and enhance Saudi Arabia's standing on the global stage.

Result: The survey revealed a moderate association (78%) between Saudi Arabia and cultural richness. This suggests that adventure tourism has the potential to promote cultural exchange and intercultural comprehension. By offering immersive cultural

experiences, such as visits to UNESCO World Heritage Sites and participation in traditional festivals, Saudi Arabia can enhance global awareness and appreciation of its cultural heritage. Positive interactions between tourists and local communities foster cross-cultural understanding and contribute to the Kingdom's positive image on the global stage.

7.5. Hypothesis 5 'Eco-Tourism and Conservation Initiatives':

The successful execution of eco-tourism and conservation initiatives, exemplified by the Saudi Green Initiative and the Red Sea Project, is hypothesised to establish Saudi Arabia as a pre-eminent destination for sustainable tourism. By attracting environmentally conscious travellers and exemplifying responsible tourism practices, these initiatives aim to position the Kingdom as a global model for sustainable tourism.

Result: The findings underscore the importance of eco-tourism and conservation initiatives in positioning Saudi Arabia as a sustainable tourism destination. Respondents expressed preferences for destinations prioritising sustainability and conservation efforts (70%), indicating a market demand for responsible tourism practices. Initiatives such as the Saudi Green Initiative and the Red Sea Project play a crucial role in attracting environmentally conscious travellers and promoting sustainable tourism practices. By showcasing environmental stewardship and responsible tourism, Saudi Arabia can emerge as a global model for sustainable tourism, aligning with Vision 2030's objectives of environmental conservation and economic diversification.

8. Comparison With Literature Review

- The study's findings align with previous research highlighting the economic potential of adventure tourism in Saudi Arabia. However, nuances in the results, such as the level of alignment with sustainable management principles, may differ from existing literature and warrant further investigation.
- Practical implications of the study's findings include recommendations for tourism decision-makers and industry stakeholders to prioritise sustainable management practices, foster public-private partnerships and leverage cultural heritage in adventure tourism promotion.

9. Theoretical and Practical Contributions

- Theoretical contributions of the study include advancing understanding of the economic, environmental and sociocultural dimensions of adventure tourism in Saudi Arabia. By examining stakeholder perceptions and preferences, the study contributes to theoretical frameworks on sustainable tourism development and destination management.
- Practical contributions involve providing actionable insights for decision-makers and industry practitioners to enhance adventure tourism experiences, promote destination sustainability and capitalise on Saudi Arabia's cultural heritage. Recommendations for future research include longitudinal studies to assess the long-term impacts of adventure tourism development initiatives.

The demographic characteristics of the participants included in the study were diverse, spanning different age groups, genders, educational backgrounds and geographic locations within Saudi Arabia. This diversity allowed for a comprehensive exploration of perceptions and preferences regarding adventure tourism in the region.

The survey results revealed that 65% of respondents rated their familiarity with Saudi Arabia's adventure tourism offerings as low, indicating a need for increased awareness and promotion efforts. Despite this, there was a recognition of the country's potential attractions, with common associations including vast deserts, historical sites and cultural richness.

Natural landscapes and cultural experiences emerged as the most important factors influencing destination choice, emphasising the significance of Saudi Arabia's geographical and cultural assets. Safety concerns were also noted, highlighting the importance of addressing safety measures to enhance visitor confidence.

Specific adventure activities, such as desert safaris and mountain climbing, were among the most popular, reflecting the appeal of Saudi Arabia's landscapes. However, interest in marine activities, such as scuba diving, was relatively low, suggesting the need for targeted promotion in this area.

Respondents' likelihood of choosing Saudi Arabia as a destination was influenced by factors such as improved safety measures, sustainable tourism practices and authentic cultural experiences. Most respondents expressed a strong preference for destinations prioritising sustainability and conservation efforts, indicating a growing demand for responsible tourism practices.

Overall, the survey findings provide valuable insights into the perceptions, preferences and concerns surrounding adventure tourism in Saudi Arabia. These insights can inform evidence-based decision-making and strategic planning for sustainable tourism development in the region.

10. Theoretical and Practical Implications

The findings of this study hold significant theoretical and practical implications for the advancement of adventure tourism in Saudi Arabia and beyond.

10.1. Theoretical Implications:

- The results of the study contribute to the theoretical understanding of adventure tourism by providing insights into the perceptions, preferences and concerns of potential visitors in the context of Saudi Arabia's unique tourism landscape.
- The study extends existing literature by investigating the role of environmental conservation efforts and sustainable tourism practices within the adventure tourism sector, thereby enriching theoretical frameworks related to sustainable tourism development.

10.2. Practical Implications:

- For decision-makers and tourism stakeholders, the findings offer valuable insights into strategic planning and decision-making processes aimed at promoting adventure tourism in Saudi Arabia.
- The identification of key factors influencing destination choice and adventure activities of interest can guide the development of targeted marketing campaigns and product offerings to attract adventure tourists.
- The emphasis on safety concerns underscores the importance of implementing robust safety measures and emergency response systems to ensure visitor safety and satisfaction.
- Furthermore, the study highlights the significance of integrating sustainability principles into destination management practices, encouraging the adoption of eco-friendly initiatives and community engagement efforts to enhance the destination's long-term viability.

11. Conclusion

In conclusion, this study sheds light on the emerging landscape of adventure tourism in Saudi Arabia within the framework of Vision 2030. By exploring perceptions, preferences and concerns of potential visitors, as well as the integration of environmental conservation and sustainable tourism practices, the study provides valuable insights for decision-makers, tourism professionals and other stakeholders. Despite not confirming or rejecting specific hypotheses, the findings offer nuanced understandings of adventure tourism dynamics in Saudi Arabia and underscore the need for further research to validate and expand upon these findings.

12. Limitations of the Study and Further Research

12.1. Limitations:

- One limitation of the study is the reliance on self-reported data, which may be subject to biases and inaccuracies.
- The study's sample size and composition may limit the generalisability of the findings to broader populations of adventure tourists.
- Additionally, the cross-sectional nature of the study limits the ability to establish causal relationships between variables.

12.2. Further Research:

- Future research could employ longitudinal or experimental designs to explore causal relationships and changes in perceptions and behaviours over time.
- Qualitative studies could provide deeper insights into the motivations and experiences of adventure tourists in Saudi Arabia.
- Comparative studies across different adventure tourism destinations could offer valuable benchmarks and insights into best practices for sustainable tourism development.
- Lastly, investigations into the socio-economic impacts of adventure tourism, including its effects on local communities and cultural heritage preservation, warrant further exploration.

By acknowledging these limitations and avenues for further research, scholars can build upon the current study's foundation and contribute to the ongoing development of adventure tourism in Saudi Arabia and beyond.

13. Recommendations

- **Advocacy for Implementation:** Advocate for the implementation of measures that support sustainable adventure tourism practices in Saudi Arabia. This could include lobbying for stricter environmental regulations, promoting responsible tourism initiatives and providing incentives for businesses to adopt eco-friendly practices.
- **Community Engagement:** Encourage increased involvement of local communities in adventure tourism activities. This could involve establishing community-based tourism initiatives, offering training programs and employment opportunities for locals, and fostering partnerships between tourism operators and residents.
- **Infrastructure Development:** Highlight the importance of investing in infrastructure to support the growth of adventure tourism. This could include improving transportation networks to remote areas, developing accommodation options that minimise environmental impact and enhancing facilities for outdoor activities such as hiking, camping and water sports.
- **Education and Awareness:** Emphasise the need for education and awareness campaigns to promote environmental conservation and sustainable tourism practices among visitors and industry stakeholders. This could involve launching public awareness campaigns, integrating sustainability into tourism education curricula and providing training for tour guides and operators on responsible tourism practices.
- **Research and Monitoring:** Advocate for increased research and monitoring efforts to better understand the impact of adventure tourism on the environment and local communities. This could include conducting environmental assessments, monitoring visitor numbers and behaviour, and collecting data on the socio-economic benefits of adventure tourism for host communities.
